We have celebrated 8 Sundays together! It is so wonderful to get to know all of you!

Have you noticed the changes we have made in worship?

- Reduced the size and number of pages in the bulletin.
- Printing only in black and white, unless there is a special reason to use color.
- We have changed the order of worship.
- Increased the readings and participation for the liturgist.
- Changed the prayers of the people to be a more general and spontaneous prayer.
- Removed the meet and greet at the beginning of the service.
- Simplified communion
- Incorporated the prayer cards into staff prayer and the prayer chain.

It is always my hope that our Sunday worship is a time of fellowship, praise, learning, participation and most especially a sacred time with God.

Being an Interim pastor I like to ask a lot of questions. By asking questions, I find out what is important to you as individuals and as a church. I invite you to also ask yourself:

Joan Chittister, a Benedictine Sister, is one of my favorite spiritual leaders. She writes this about Lent:

Lent is a call to weep for what we could have been and are not. Lent is the grace to grieve for what we should have done and did not. Lent is the opportunity to change what we ought to change but have not. Lent is not about penance. Lent is about becoming, doing and changing whatever it is that is blocking the fullness of life in us right now. Lent is a summons to live anew.

Need Transportation?

What happens if you cannot drive anymore? How does one get to the doctor's office or do errands without being able to drive? There are private businesses in the Oro Valley community that offer non-emergency transportation for a fee. All the non-emergency transportation companies require to be preregistered with them before making an advance reservation. Here is a list of private non-emergency transportation options:

- 1. First call is your health insurance company. Check to see if your policy provides nonemergency transportation.
- 2. <u>Sun Shuttle bus service</u> provides non-emergency transportation "Dail-a-ride" to your front door. The "Dail-a-ride" contact number is 520-229-4990 or their website is <u>www.orovalleyaz.gov</u>. At this time senior riders can ride the bus for free. If you are using a walker and/or wheelchair then you need another type of transportation that can accommodate your needs. The "Dail-a-Ride" requires you to apply for an American Disability Certificate. The contact number for the "American Disability Act" (ADA) office is 520-791-5409. The certificate holder can call the "Dail-a-Ride." The "Dail-a-Ride" will send out a special vehicle for you to be pick you up at your front door.
- B & B Transportation is a private non-emergency transporter. Their contact number is 520-883-0384 and the website is: www.bnbtransportation.com. They can provide wheelchairs and/or stretcher transportation. Reservations needed. You do not need the American Disability Certificate to use them.
- Western Medical Transportation Service: contact 4. 520-460-6925 at: or website: www.westmedtransport.com. This nonemergency service provides for the ambulatory, wheelchair and/or stretcher transportation. They offer also (for a charge) a caregiver/attendant (upon request) to go with the individual to their appointment. They do "Compassionate Hospice" transportation. The service can do extended iournevs.
- 5. Handicar is another private non-emergency transporter. Their contact number to make a reservation is 520-464-6872 ext. 26648 or the

website is <u>www.myhandicar.com</u>. They do offer services that can accommodate walkers/wheelchairs.

- 6. <u>GoGo Grandparents Transportation</u> is another private service that is available. Their contact number is 1(855)464-6872 ext. 95033 or the website is <u>www.gogograndpartent.com</u> Call and check them out. They will even pick up your prescriptions.
- Veteran Transportation Program (VTP). Need a ride? Use the DAV hospital service (HSC) coordinator Directory to contact the nearest ride needs.

- 8. Uber Health offers non-emergency transportation. They do not have a telephone number but do have use. website to The website is а www.uberhealth.com. They offer two different options in transportation. The first option is "UberX" option is for ambulatory person who does not need extra time to get to the vehicle. The second option is "Uber Comfort." This service allows extra time for the person to get to and from their front door and place of business. Another transportation is "UberWAV" which is for wheelchair service.
- 7. <u>Lyft Pass for healthcare transportation</u>. There is only a website to contact at <u>www.lyft.com/healthcare</u>.
- 8. <u>Angel Med Flight</u> is a medical air transportation service. The contact number is 1(877)639-4896 or the website is www.angelmedflight.com

Yes, I have provided you with non-emergency transportation options because everyone's needs are different. I needed a non-emergency transportation last year to take me to an appointment. I called my insurance company, and my policy offered me 12 one-way transportations for free. I decided to take this option instead of calling a friend to take me to the medical appointment and all went well. I have done the work for you, so keep it in a place you can pull out to use it later.

History, Concept, and Goals of the E-mail Prayer Chain

The email prayer chain came into being 20 years ago, when Nancy and I lived in a remote mountain area in Northern California. Our church, the Sierra city United Methodist Church, was at the end of a three-church circuit which covered three scattered mountain villages.

Even though we were widely separated, we were all part of the same church family, and although we rarely got together in worship, we wanted to stay connected with each other in faith and in prayer. In response to that need, the North Gold Circuit email prayer chain was formed, linking us all together. It grew to include other congregations and denominations as well.

When Nancy and I moved to Arízona 12 years ago and joined Vista church, I was asked by the then pastor, what I could do for the church. Knowing that, although Vista had a large congregation, a significant number were snowbirds and went elsewhere during the hot summer months. It occurred to me that this yearly occurrence, in many respects, mirrored the separation of the three churches in the North Gold Circuit, and that the same email prayer chain concept had the potential of keeping us all connected.

The concept is quite simple. Prayer requests are sent to me by individuals who have signed up to be part of the prayer chain, by the pastor, and any individual, whether a member of the church prayer chain or not, who wishes a prayer to be lifted up. I then either write up a prayer request and send it out or forward an existing emailed prayer request to prayer chain members, using B.C.C. so that no one can see anyone else's email address.

Even though we currently have 42 active members, the goal would be to have all or most of the congregation linked in this fashion, so that no matter where a person may be at any time, he or she can always remain in contact and in joined prayer with other members of our church family.

remains one that is kept as a museum for visitors. It is located just South of Tucson. (The Titan Missile Museum is at 1580 W Duval Mine Rd, Green Valley, AZ 85614).

Jim Bleess said it took twentyeight tons of rocks to complete the Sun Wheel. There are seven viewing stations. One points to the equinox, and one station points to Kitt Peak. Viewing stations point to the Vernal Equinox on March 20th, the Summer Solstice on June 21st, the Autumnal Equinox on September 23rd, and the Winter Solstice on December 21st.

Vista de la Montaña United Methodist Church is on land previously owned by the U.S. Government. These ten acres were once a Titan 2 missile site complete with a silo, missile, and warhead (now deactivated, removed, and backfilled).

According to the National Park Service, the piles of rocks often found on hiking trails are called Bates Cairns. They are named after Waldron Bates, the lead author of the hiking maps still referenced to create today's trail maps. The cairn found in Catalina at Vista de la Montaña United Methodist Church should possibly be named after Jim Bleess. He built it in the center of the Sun Wheel he constructed at the South end of the Church parking lot.

The Sun Wheel was two years in the making. Underneath the cairn is where the base of the radio antenna for the Titan Ballistic Missile used to be. The antenna was to receive the signal to launch, not direct the flight of the missile, to its eventual location in the event of war. All the Titan Ballistic Missile sites around Tucson have been dismantled and the silos filled with rocks and concrete. There All are welcome from first light until twilight hours. No overnight camping, tenting, or RV parking. Check-in at the church office, if open, as a courtesy. Please stay on the gravel path.
