What are Ben's Bells?

If you have been in Tucson area for sometime you may have heard of Ben's Bells or you may have seen the *Be Kind* logo (especially on schools). This organization came to life in 2002. Following is the story from the website: bensbells.org.

In 2002, Jeannette Maré's life changed forever when her son, Ben, died suddenly just before his third birthday. In the months following his death, Jeannette and her friends and family began making ceramic wind chimes - the first Ben's Bells - in her backyard studio. Being surrounded by supportive people and working with clay toward a common goal was therapeutic for her family and their healing.

During this time, Jeannette learned how a small act of kindness could make such a difference in a person's life, no matter their background. She wanted to find a way to teach others about the impact of intentional acts of kindness, and so the idea for the Bell came to life. Jeannette and her friends made four hundred Bells and randomly distributed them in the Tucson community on the first anniversary of Ben's death. Through these Bells, she had found a way to pay forward the kindnesses that had been shown to her.

This started a powerful ripple effect. People who found the Bells shared their own stories of grief and healing and hope. The local newspaper printed the story on the front page. School groups and businesses and individuals started calling to see how they could get involved and soon, thousands of Tucsonans were helping to craft Ben's Bells.

Since 2003, Ben's Bells has been operating as a nonprofit, growing kindness education programs and continuing to distribute thousands of Bells every year. Today Bells are found all over the world and our free kindness education programming has reached over 1.6 million students.

Ben's Bells are colorful ceramic ornaments hung in communities throughout the world as symbols of kindness for people to find and take home. Thousands of volunteers visit our studios and help us make Bells each year. By the time each Bell is hung, many hands have had a part in its journey, and it represents the efforts of an entire community coming together to make one person's day a little kinder.

But that's not all we do!

Ben's Bells educates communities about the benefits of kindness and the skills we need to make kindness part of our daily lives. Kindness can be easy, or it can require great skill, and when we practice regularly our small actions make a larger impact than a single random act. Our programs are designed to help us understand the human brain so we can develop our awareness and compassion – both for ourselves and others.

INTENTIONAL KINDNESS

Ben's Bells teaches individuals and communities about the positive impacts of intentional kindness and inspires people to practice kindness as a way of life.

KIND PRACTICES

Ben's Bells programs are based on the belief that everyone has the capacity to be kind and that kindness can be cultivated through education, visual reminders, and ongoing practice.

CHANGE THE WORLD

By recognizing, valuing, and practicing intentional kindness, we can change the world.

Devin currently maintains a private piano and oboe studio, and serves as an accompanist for the woodwind department at the UofA. He is especially fond of modern French flute repertoire, with Dutilleux, Bozza, and Jolivet being some of his favorite composers. In addition, Mr. Gardner performs throughout Arizona and Texas with the Arizona Opera, Sierra Vista Symphony, El Paso Symphony, and St. Philips in the Hills. Living in the scenic Foothills with his two beautiful dogs Venkman and Zeddemore--named after two of his favorite Ghostbusters--he is also an avid participant in bowling, pool, and darts, and enjoys walking with his dogs all over Oro Valley and Marana.

Serving Him, Your Mission Team

We have received the good news that our sister church Fuente de Vida is, growing and prospering. Pastor Gela has reported that many new people have been baptized and received into membership.

At the present time, they have five college students in the University or tech school, thanks to Vista's Roach Scholarship fund. This past week Pastor Gela attended a conference for all the pastors in the Agua Prieta area. They all enjoyed the participation and fellowship that was shared together.

Palm Sunday they celebrate their 23rd year of ministry in the Colonia (started in 2001). God has truly blessed this mission project and caused it to grow to what it is today. Pastor Gela sends her gratitude to all of us at Vista that have been such a big part of their growing ministry.

On July 10 thru the 14th, Fuenta de Vida has been chosen to host the Annual Conference. This Conference includes all the Methodist churches in three states (Sinaloa, Sonora, and Baja). Many of these Methodist churches are small and are unable to pay a living wage to their pastors. That means those pastors must hold a second job in order to support their families. We have been asked to make a collection of clothing, suitable for church gatherings, for these pastors for both male and female. This would include accessories like neck ties and jeweler. A clothing rack will be placed in the nursery, starting the first Sunday in May, for you to bring in clothing items on hangers and place them on the rack.
